*Gross Anatomy Workshop Statement

The Use of Human Anatomical Specimens
*The College of Medicine teaches anatomic sciences using multiple teaching modalities such as lectures, textbook illustrations, radiographs, and photographs. Perhaps the most important component of medical anatomy education is the inspection and hands-on dissection of the cadaver in the laboratory. This opportunity allows students to compare the radiographic images, and other anatomical depictions, to the real three dimensional relationships of the body and its organs.

The acquisition of bodies to use in anatomic studies is carefully regulated, with complete focus on the wishes of those donating their body after death for this educational activity. All donors consent to these studies while living, with a full understanding of what is involved in anatomical dissection and study. Students are carefully oriented to the donation procedure and are instructed to study the body with a deep respect and reverence for the donor's gift.
